### *Light at the End of the Tunnel*

Our family likes to bicycle, participating in group tours (MS TRAM), going for family rides, and enjoying getting places under our power. One of the most memorable cycling experiences for us was when Kurt, Joyce and I bicycled the Elroy to Sparta Rail-to-Trail in Wisconsin. Scattered along the old railroad line in Coulee Country are four tunnels that range in length from a short quarter mile to the longest one: 3,810 feet long, almost  $\frac{3}{4}$  of a mile. At each end are big doors, left over from when the trains used them, to keep animals and elements out. When you enter each tunnel, you move from the bright sunshine and warmth of the summer, to the cool, damp darkness of the rail tunnel. You enter the blackness with your flashlight or headlamp on and push your bike, careful not to trip or run into anything or anyone. Way down, far ahead, especially on the longest, Tunnel 3, you might see a little pinhole shaft of light at the end of the tunnel—but it's pretty black except for your little flashlight. Slowly, as you get closer, the light at the end of the tunnel grows; very slowly at first, then more quickly, it grows until you sense you will be there any minute. Suddenly, you burst out into the light and warmth and you turn off your flashlight and get back on your bikes (Joyce and I rented a tandem that day!). More paths and scenery lie ahead.



I can't help but think how we are in the tunnel right now with our community and church as we live with Covid19. I believe that we are still in the tunnel, and it's dark, and we've been in it awhile. And I believe that we've got to walk through it, together. It's hard to see where we are going except for a few feet ahead, or days ahead. It's hard to see beyond our own little cone of light coming from our flashlight, or our own home, or local infection rate. And the light at the end of the tunnel seems so small, in the midst of our total blackness. The light at the end of the tunnel is what draws and motivates us. The light at the end of the tunnel is what we focus on and keep moving toward. For many of us that light is a vaccine for Covid19. For some of us that light is a resumption of "normal life." But for us at Granite Falls Lutheran Church, Jesus Christ is the light at the end of the tunnel, the goal in the midst of this darkness, the endpoint of our lives together in Christ. Incredible light and warmth.

And so let us walk together, holding our lights, drawn by the light at the end of the tunnel: Jesus Christ. It is no coincidence that he is "the Light of the World" in John's Gospel. I have stressed over and over again with many of you that you are not alone in that tunnel, even if you are socially distanced. We are here with you and for you. Let us bring the light of Christ into your home, let us bring Holy Communion into your home, as the days grow shorter and the nights longer. Let us guard and guide each other through this tunnel, into the light of Christ. Christmas is a season of light, for people of light.

Finally, Joyce and I want to express a Merry and Holy Christmas to you all. You have taken us into your community, your homes, and your hearts. You have called me to be your pastor, something I value greatly and take to heart. Every time I enter your home, I become that much more your pastor, and this place becomes that much more a home to Joyce and I. Your care and concern were very much evident during my dad's death. We have come under unusual and difficult circumstances, but we have nonetheless come under the care and calling of God through Granite Falls Lutheran Church, and for this we are grateful to you.

## Our Evolving Confirmation Program

What started as an ambitious plan to have a large-group style, discussion-based confirmation program evolved into a graded, small-group style program, and has since evolved once again to a digitally-based, distance-learning style we call "Zoomfirmation." As Pastors, every time we make plans for one thing, circumstances changed; probably many students and parents have felt the same way at school. This has been difficult for all of us, including parents, and Pastor Paul and I want to thank you parents for following through on your baptismal vows and making sure your students are engaged to the best of your ability. It is even better when we see you on-line with them "in class." We are committed to a confirmation education AND relationship with us and each other, no matter our public health circumstances and limitations. At this point in time, we are conducting classes on-line as "Zoomfirmation," shooting for the FIRST and THIRD Wednesdays of the month at 7:30pm. Because of the halting start we experienced this fall, and the expectation that we will probably be using a distance model through the winter, "Zoomfirmation" will be held on December 2 and 16, and January 6 and 20. We have learned to not make solid plans much farther out than that, but may continue into Lent in order to get the number of lessons we have planned completed. Because of our difficult scheduling this fall and winter, we have not been able to offer regular service project opportunities, but may consider an outside "project day" sometime in the spring in order to take care of our service project hours in one experience. Once again, a huge "thank you" to parents and students who have stayed engaged during these difficult times; God will bless you for your efforts!

## ***Pastor Paul's Annual Reflection***

Grace and Peace from our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, amen. It's been a rather eventful year, both for us as a congregation, and for myself. Here are a few things I've learned over the past year.

### **1. The folks of Granite Falls Lutheran Church are very generous**

When I moved here last October, there was a group of 20-30 people who welcomed me. They moved me into my new rental place in record time, and made it the easiest move of my life. I was somewhat dreading unloading all my stuff, as I had spent the whole morning loading the truck on my own (including my 135 pound peloton bike). The hospitality I received immediately truly warmed my heart and also saved my back.

I think of another time, when my car broke down along 212 in Stewart on the way back from the cities. In a panic (it was Saturday) I called Val, who reached out to Kathy and Barry Anderson. Not only did they drive the hour plus to come get me and bring me home, Barry and I drove out the next morning to bring back my poor Subaru. I figure I probably could have made a friend at the nearby bar, but I'm quite glad I didn't have to!

There are many other small acts of generosity I've experienced in my time here, from the gift of grocery shopping while I was quarantined, to fresh produce, to honey, to many recommendations about where to go to buy what. I'm incredibly thankful for everyone's generosity, it has made my move from South Minneapolis to rural Minnesota much less jarring.

### **2. The COVID-19 pandemic has forced me to learn more about disease prevention than I ever wanted to know**

I don't mean to list this as a complaint, it's not. However, I never quite expected to spend so much time on the Minnesota Department of Health's (website when I graduated seminary). I didn't learn about aerosol v. droplet spread, or the relative quanta singing puts out compared to speaking, or the efficacy of different mask fabrics. The last nine months have been a crash course that none of us asked for. However, I care deeply about all of you, and learning about disease prevention is important. I have to thank all the folks who have advised Pastor Manning and myself along the way, and I want to give a special thanks to the council for wrestling with these really difficult decisions that have no easy answer. I'm glad I'm not doing this alone.

### **3. Technology is lovely and spiteful**

Need I say more? Sometimes it works, sometimes it don't.

### **4. It is easier to be a co-pastor than to be a solo pastor**

This is also somewhat obvious, but having Pastor Manning here has been a boon for me. It's allowed me to take breathers from time to time, and actually to take time off. For example, between January 2020 and May 2020 I took one day off. My first Sunday off of 2020 came on August 30th. Some of this is related to the COVID-19 pandemic, but much of it is due to being a solo pastor in a church set up for two pastors. It's been a benefit to have a more experienced pastor around, and to be able to use the vacation days I have. Thanks, Pastor Mark!

### **5. It is a blessing to care for the sick and dying**

By far, my most meaningful moments as a pastor have been around caring for sick and dying members. It's a thin space, where the presence of God is more closely felt. I feel God at work in those hushed conversations around a hospital bed, or those hard decisions about what care to provide. I am honored when I can walk with a family in the grieving process. It's not something that I look forward to, as these events are emotionally and physically draining, but they are certainly holy. At the most basic level, I became a pastor to serve people, and providing solace in a moment of darkness is the best service I can give.

I give thanks for this loving and compassionate congregation. Thank you for your generosity. Thank you for your willingness to let me experiment. I look forward to seeing what God can do through us!

## **Granite Falls Lutheran Church Semi-Annual Meeting Minutes November 22, 2020**

President Chad Friese opened the Fall Semi-Annual Meeting at 10:00 am on November 22, 2020. The meeting was conducted on Facebook Live due to the Covid 19 pandemic. (On May 12, 2020 the Council approved the continuing resolution language to allow the meeting to be held electronically and by phone.) The meeting agenda, 2021 budget and a letter from Pastor Mark Manning had been made available in advance on email and by paper copy in the east entry way of the church. A quorum of members was present: in person (church council members) and on Facebook Live.

Pastor Mark Manning began the meeting with prayer.

Chad read the written resolution from the church Council to extend a permanent call to Pastor Paul Drees. Chad opened the voting on the call for Pastor Paul. Voting commenced on Facebook Live, by email and by phone.

Pastor Paul and Pastor Mark each gave brief reports including Covid updates and thanks to the congregation members for their understanding and for their financial support for the church during these times.

Chad answered two phone-in questions concerning the call process for Pastor Paul.

Because a previous resolution had not been made, a motion was made by Shawnn Martin, seconded by Tim Opdahl to present the 2021 budget to the congregation for approval.

Shawnn Martin gave a financial report. Shawnn thanked the congregation for their financial support during Covid. He reviewed the current budget balances. He mentioned the Payroll Protection Plan (PPP) loan of \$64,100 from the SBA and the CARES Act grant of \$14,581.88 from Yellow Medicine County. Paperwork has begun for forgiveness of the PPP loan. The congregation has recently received two bequests, one for \$50,000 and one for \$59,000. It has also completed and paid for the bell tower repair. (Thanks to the Endowment Committee for their gift of \$22,500 for this project.) Shawnn presented the 2021 budget which had been distributed on-line and in paper copies.

Chad opened the discussion period on the budget and then proceeded to the vote. Again votes were cast on Facebook Live, by email and by phone.

Chad announced the results of the vote to extend a permanent call to Pastor Paul Drees. Yes-90 votes; No-10 votes.

President's Report – Chad thanked the council for their work during the Covid pandemic. The ultimate goal is the safety of congregational members. By-law revisions will wait until the spring semi-annual meeting to allow for the proper timing for any proposed changes to be presented.

Pastor Mark and Pastor Paul sang several hymns while waiting for the budget vote to conclude.

Chad announced the votes for the 2021 budget. Yes-85 votes; No-2 votes.

Pastor Paul gave the closing benediction.

Chad Friese adjourned the meeting.

## The Stewardship See-Saw

***“When you have eaten and are full—then beware, lest you forget the LORD.” Deuteronomy 6.11-12***

Moses is giving his great speech to the Israelites just as they are preparing to enter the Promised Land—“a land flowing with milk and honey.” But then he warns them. The blessing can become a curse; prosperous lives and full stomachs can make us sleepy.

I think about this from time to time. I remember looking back, trying to convince our kids that we were “rich.” It was a hard sell. They thought of all they wanted, and the many, many more things their friends possessed. And when things got a little tight, I acted like I was money-poor too, even when I was surrounded by many, many good things. As Joyce and I made this move and sorted through past files (how many years to keep all that stuff?), I came across my early Letters of Call, with my contract provisions. I truly am rich in every way now, compared to where I started. I guess I’ve gotten sleepy.

A 2009 Gallup Poll surveyed adults in more than 100 countries and asked, “Is religion an important part of your daily life?” Participants could respond “Yes” or “No.” Then they researched each country’s per-capita income levels. Here’s what they found:

### **Gallup Question: “Is Religion an important of your daily life?”**

<u>Per-Capita Income</u>	<u>Yes</u>	<u>No</u>
\$0-\$2,000	95%	5%
\$2,000-\$5,000	92%	7%
\$5,000-\$12,500	82%	17%
\$12,501-\$25,000	70%	28%
\$25,001+	47%	52%

**Generally speaking, the more affluent a country is, the less religious its citizens are.**

Now, the goal of stewardship is a living relationship with God in Jesus Christ through our things and gifts and abilities. But why would God bless us with so much if it would only lead us away from Jesus Christ? It seems as if our lives are a “see-saw” between too many riches and too little faith, and too little riches and lots of (too much?) faith. It seems as if God’s gifts, in our sinful hands, become our doomed downfall. What is happening; and why?

The key is in understanding that God doesn’t bless us in order to **cloud** our relationship with Him—to “see-saw” our lives between riches and faith—but to **clarify** our relationship with Him. When we truly see how much, how “rich”—or even what little—we have, we begin to see **who** gives it; and when we see **who** gives it, we want to be closer and more thankful to **the Giver**. So our first task is to “wake up” from our sleep, and see the one who gives us everything, every day, in our “daily bread.”

During this season of giving and receiving remember this one thing: you already have the gift of Jesus and the gift of Eternal Life. **You are rich!** What more do you need? Maybe not much more stuff. What can you give? Anything from your riches! **May God Bless You with the Richness of Open Eyes.**

## *A Time to Listen then Speak*



*"The LORD called Samuel a third time, and Samuel got up and went to Eli and said, 'Here I am; you called me.' Then Eli realized that the LORD was calling the boy. So Eli told Samuel, 'Go and lie down, and if he calls you, say, Speak, LORD, for your servant is listening.' So Samuel went and lay down in his place." 1 Samuel 3.8-9*

This fall has been a difficult one to conduct "normal" ministry, and as we approach Advent and Christmas, our growing public health circumstance seems to be making it even more difficult. For all of us, this will not be a "normal" Christmas. However, at Granite Falls Lutheran Church we are committed to Preaching, Teaching and Administering the Sacraments, despite everything else. To meet these goals we are conducting worship on-line over Facebook, YouTube and cable TV, as well as in-person when local public health circumstances permit. We are Teaching through a short, weekly on-line email devotional; anyone who desires to receive this can contact the church office. It generally comes out on Wednesday, and is keyed to one of the upcoming Sunday preaching texts. Pastor Paul and I are trying to think up new ways of meeting this Teaching goal, using any means possible. We cannot wait until we can gather with you in-person once again. Finally, administering the sacrament of Holy Communion is extremely important to us, as it is to you, especially in this Holy Season. We will probably not be able to have Holy Communion in church on Christmas Eve, which greatly saddens me. But we are committed to making sure that you have the opportunity to receive Holy Communion during this Advent and Christmas season.

So in order to do this we need your help: please call the church office and we will come to your house to bring you communion. We might not be able to come in, but we can bring it and arrange for a time to call you, talk and visit, and make sure you have bread and wine, and Christ's body and blood, and hear those words "Given and shed for you" (even if only over the phone). But like the servant Samuel, we need to hear your voices! Call us at church and let us know, and we will make arrangements. We need to hear your voices! You won't be "bothering" us, you will be helping us to be God's Servants. We need to hear your voices! It's a different way of doing things, but these times demand that we do things differently. We need to hear your voices, so that we can come to speak God's promises through words AND wine and bread.
